

Tiya Miles' National Book Award-winning work, *All That She Carried, The Journey of Ashley's Sack, A Black Family Keepsake* (Penguin Random House, 2021), illustrates the value of tradition and history and portrays how we move forward when all around us is in disarray. Our writers and scholars have always caused us to uncover hidden truths and to critically assess and interrogate the books and information that we are exposed to, whether that be on the internet, in the media, at public forums, or in classrooms. The National Black Writers Conference, a program of the Center for Black Literature at Medgar Evers College, CUNY (CBL), is a gathering of writers, scholars, literary professionals, and the general public where we will raise questions. We'll focus on the literature produced by Black writers throughout the African diaspora, explore the value of history and legacy in literature, examine the impact of environmental and systemic racism, assess the impact of social media and the internet, investigate the world of publishing, reflect on the need for peace and emotional healing, and host readings and talkshops on publishing and the craft of writing.


Black Writers' Letters to America


The Power of Historical Narratives
